If a medical provider gives a child a book starting with their newborn well-child visit, families begin to understand the importance of reading aloud together with their child and the importance of the everyday moments they share.

Families learn that reading aloud together with their children is the single most important action they can take to develop strong parent-child bonds that last a lifetime, support the critical development of their child's brain and strengthen resilience.

OUR

Our vision is to provide a medically based literacy intervention that becomes part of the standard of primary care for all children birth to 5 years of age. Using books as tools, Reach Out and Read empowers providers to positively impact families and caregivers in their daily interactions with children through shared language and stories.



Reach Out and Read uses a public health framework to promote safe, stable, nurturing relationships as a standard of care in and out of the well-child visit.

Reach Out and Read works because it's embedded into preexisting medical systems. We transform the well-child visit experience for both the provider and patient and offer an effective strategy for improving child health outcomes by incorporating early literacy promotion into primary health care.

Reach Out and Read is *powerful*, cost-effective, and scalable.

When medical providers deliver our model with high fidelity, children and families realize the outcomes shown in our evidence base.



The Primary Care Provider – coaching and building skills in parents and caregivers; modeling and supporting early brain development and strong relationships: During well-child visits, the doctor prescribes reading by modeling read-aloud strategies while teaching and training the parent how to share books and why it is important. Parents are engaged in the conversation as the provider offers anticipatory guidance and emphasizes how reading brings families together.



The Book: Each child is given a new, culturally and developmentally appropriate book to take home, building a collection of 10-15 new books in the home before the child goes to kindergarten.



Resource-Rich Environment: Clinic environments support resource-rich messaging to families, aiding providers in delivering community health resources and assisting parents in daily literacy activities with their children.

During well visits, ROR trained clinicians talk with parents about the benefits of reading aloud and sharing with their young children beginning at birth. We show them how to hold books to best engage their children, and how to interact with the text and images to help them follow along. We share advice for talking about stories with infants, toddlers. and preschoolers. Families gain a deeper understanding of why they should make reading a daily habit, and leave inspired to cuddle up with their young one and a book.

WHEN YOU GIVE A CHILD pook...

The books give the child something to focus on and you can watch the parent child interaction and reinforce the positive behaviors. ROR's two generation, evidence—based model helps move primary care to a more comprehensive approach to meet the health care needs of children and families. The intervention lives at the intersection of health and literacy, and trained medical providers use books and anticipatory guidance as valuable tools to talk to parents and caregivers about what's happening in their life; challenges and opportunities; and the benefits of reading aloud to their young children.
