Research shows that lifelong health is connected to and positively correlated with the development of literacy skills. We also know that the development of literacy skills relies on emotional connections, interactive exchanges, and positive childhood experiences. Reach Out and Read supports both the development of literacy skills through discussion of age-appropriate literacy milestones and the important underlying emotional connections by fostering crucial moments together. ROR is a preventative health intervention that supports overall healthy development.

As a tier-one public health intervention, the ROR model plays a crucial role in aiding both clinicians and families during primary care visits. In the formative years of a child's life, checkups offer consistent support to children and their adult caregivers. At each of these visits, the ROR intervention serves as an essential tool for clinicians while also functioning as a resource for families, fostering the enhancement of healthy routines and relationships. By incorporating this public health approach to early relational health into their practice, clinicians focus on the fundamental goal of positive child development.

Over the past year, ROR has grown our footprint and successfully scaled in communities across the region. This expansion enables us to touch the lives of even more children and families through the trusted voice of their medical clinician.

Powerful Public Health Intervention



ROR is more than a just literacy program; it is a proven and powerful public health intervention.

By embedding ROR into routine healthcare visits, we reach families at a crucial point in their children's lives through the trusted voice of their medical clinician.

This approach allows us to address social drivers of health and provide families with the tools they need to nurture their child's cognitive, emotional, and social well-being.

Through partnerships with healthcare systems, community organizations, and policymakers, ROR contributes to a broader public health agenda focused on early childhood development and creating foundations of success.

Our Model



The Primary Care Provider – coaching and building skills in parents and caregivers; modeling and supporting early brain development and strong relationships: During well-child visits, the clinician prescribes reading by modeling read-aloud strategies while teaching and training how to share books and why it is important. Parents are engaged in the conversation as the provider offers anticipatory guidance and emphasizes how reading brings families together.



The Book: Each child is given a new, culturally and developmentally appropriate book to take home, building a collection of 10-15 new books in the home before the child goes to kindergarten.



Resource-Rich Environment: Clinic environments support resourcerich messaging to families, aiding providers in delivering community health resources and assisting parents in daily literacy activities with their children.

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As a passionate advocate for child and family well-being, I understand the value of Reach Out and Read. This program not only promotes early literacy and school readiness but also nurtures the parent-child social and emotional bonds which helps to foster healthier families and communities. Research has consistently demonstrated the positive impact of ROR on clinic culture, patient relationships, and healthcare effectiveness. **Studies reveal that the implementation of ROR:**

- Increases attendance at well-child visits, leading to better health outcomes for children.
- Enhances the quality of care and contributes to a more efficient healthcare system. By incorporating reading into well-child visits, Reach Out and Read enables providers to accomplish multiple objectives simultaneously, including surveillance, relationship building, and promoting early literacy through book prescriptions.

Reach Out and Read is committed to strong relationships with all clinicians across our network. We strive to partner with a diverse network of ROR clinician champions and leaders—culturally, geographically, institutionally, and by specialty. By partnering with clinicians, we strengthen the ROR intervention. The active and positive contributions, participation, involvement, and interaction of clinicians positions ROR as a key player in the larger eco-system that supports children and families.

As the Regional Director of Medical Engagement and Training, Teandra Ramos has built a framework across our Affiliate that is now being lifted to the National level allowing her to support all Affiliates across the country. Her work has included several projects that keep a strategic lens of clinician partnership central to every aspect of our work, which includes:



- Education and training of residents and students to build a diverse pipeline/bench of clinician champions
- Professional development opportunities for practicing clinicians
- Elevating the importance of early, healthy relationships between children and the adults who care for them
- Optimizing ROR in clinical settings to enhance relationships between clinicians and patients/families
- Supporting research, quality improvement, and other scholarly activities
- Convening medical leaders to provide a platform for diverse clinical and medical perspectives, knowledge, and imperatives to help guide and shape our work
- Responding to feedback from the field and offering niche programming and support services resources, tools, materials to clinicians
- Supporting the development and implementation of an inaugural fellowship for Reach Out and Read.

New Research from Our Region



The Effect of Exposure to Reach Out and Read on Shared Reading Behaviors, a multi-year study, demonstrates that the delivery of the ROR model effectively encourages parents/caregivers to read with their young children using strategies that promote parent-child bonding and connection.

The results include:



Returning parents/caregivers, those who had previously been exposed to Reach Out and Read's program, were **27 percent more likely to report reading or looking at books with their child every day**, compared to parents/caregivers who had no previous exposure to the program.




Returning parents/caregivers were **significantly more likely to engage in positive shared reading behaviors that support parent/ caregiver engagement and bonding.** Those behaviors include letting the child turn pages, making up stories about the pictures, asking the child about the pictures, helping identify things in the pictures, and reading for at least 30 minutes every day.

This research had a data set of over 100,000 surveys collected across the Carolinas over 6 years.
